C&WG / Wave Investigation Concluded

Guernsey's utilities regulator has directed C&W Guernsey to start negotiating with Wave Telecom to give Wave Telecom better access to its network. It follows a complaint from Wave Telecom that C&WG had breached a number of its license conditions by its refusal to enter into negotiations. The Office of Utility Regulation has upheld that complaint.

"Interconnection is very important for competition and is an essential service required by new operators. C&WG should have been aware of what was required of it and acted in a much more constructive manner", said John Curran, Director General of the OUR. "This dispute has highlighted a significant failing in the level of service that C&WG should be providing to other telecoms providers and I would now hope that serious efforts are made to address this point."

Wave Telecom complained to the regulator that despite attempting for 5 months to enter discussions with C&WG on providing a further point of interconnection from C&WG's Castel Exchange, C&WG had refused. The OUR found that C&WG had breached two separate licence conditions by its actions.

"While I acknowledge that C&WG has now agreed to enter negotiations with Wave Telecom, as an international telecoms company, it should be aware of the level of service that is reasonably expected of a company of its standing" said John Curran. "It is therefore very disappointing that its approach to negotiations with Wave Telecom on this occasion has been less than ideal and more worryingly, that its communications with wholesale customers has fallen short of what would be reasonably expected."
